Ideas to Celebrate Gifted Awareness, 13 to 19 June 2016

Ideas for teachers, centres and schools:

- Complete the GAW Opinion Poll <u>www.nzcge.co.nz/</u> <u>giftedawarenessweek</u>
- Join in the GAW Blog Tour <u>www.nzcge.co.nz/blog</u>
- Read the NZ Gifted Education charities' position statement <u>www.nzcge.co.nz</u>, <u>www.giftednz.org.nz</u>, <u>www.giftedchildren.org.nz</u>
- Showcase the work of gifted and talented learners throughout your school.
- Provide a parent, whanau and community information evening for sharing your organisation's initiatives in gifted and talented education.
- Feature gifted and talented education in your newsletter.
- Run a competition for students this could be anything from a scrabble-a-thon to a poster contest.
- Share your achievements and those of your students with the local newspaper.
- Write to your local Member of Parliament.
- Encourage your gifted and talented learners and their parents to contact their local MPs, sharing their experiences.
- Invite your local MP to visit. Encourage him or her to talk with teachers, students and parents.
- Host a movie evening! Show a film about gifted and talented individuals. See Hoagie's web page for ideas www.hoagiesgifted.org/movies.htm.
- Run a book discussion group based on biographical or fictional depictions of giftedness. See <u>http://www. hoagiesgifted.org/biographies.htm</u> or <u>http://www. hoagiesgifted.org/featuring_gifted.htm</u> for some great ideas!
- Join an association for gifted and talented education.
- Dedicate a staff meeting to professional discussions and dialogue about gifted and talented education.
- Distribute professional readings to your staff about

gifted and talented education. Facilitate professional discussions about these.

- Have a special day to celebrate giftedness. Perhaps you could set aside 'a tall poppies day' when students dress in red, draw or create poppies, or plant a garden of poppies. Or how about an 'unfurling of the koru day' to show development and growth, dressing in green, etc. Students can dress as their gifted and talented heroes and heroines and have a 'hero parade'!
- Host a talent quest! Acknowledge the wide range of talents in your students.
- Find out about local and regional services for gifted kids in your area.
- Attend an event hosted by one of our organisations. Visit our websites to find out what is happening in your area!
- Celebrate your students' creativity by having a 'maker space' for an afternoon and use some technology challenges as stimuli for creative problem-solving.
