Five questions with Dean Blair on his financial literacy school boot camps

1 • What was your motivation to set up the programme?

After many years' work working on finance with clients, I realised there is a lack of financial literacy in NZ and we need to teach children so they are better financially prepared.

2 • How have students responded to the boot camps?



They love the programme. The students participate freely and particularly enjoy the estate planning and insurance session. The scary thing is how much they know about deferred payments, interest free terms and how easy it is to get a line of credit; we have normalised debt in NZ.

3 • How did parents respond?

Parents aren't always so keen! Money is a difficult subject to talk about and often leads to tension in relationships, so it is often avoided. Some are also probably sceptical of who we are and why we were there.

4 • What was the involvement of sporting stars?

We involved local sporting stars such as Ben Sigmund and Brad Shields, so kids can listen to their experiences with money. They explain how they grew up and first learnt about money and their challenges in managing money. They emphasise that what you do with money is far more important than how much you earn.

5 • Why do you call the programmes 'boot camps'?

Finance and money is a topic we don't often talk about and there is a fear to ask questions about investing and how markets work. I wanted to make it fun to learn about money management, investing, wealth creation, debt management and risk management. There must also be an element of hard work and discipline, which people associate with a boot camp.

Rotary beyond our club



The St Joseph-Benton Harbour Club in Michigan has developed an interesting student mentoring programme. Students in the local high school write a 250-word essay about their dream job. Club members then use Rotary connections to organise 'reverse interviews' so each student gets the opportunity to interview people working in their dream job. Assisted by their Rotary mentor, the student interviews the professional about their typical work day, good and bad parts of the job and any advice they can give the student on how to achieve their goals. The experience helps the students picture life in their dream

job on a day-to-day basis and to find out the problems people face in their role. The students then report back to the Club. Any club can set up the programme, using materials available on the <u>club website</u>.


And the last word from me this week is that
